This type of sentence can be classified as a complex sentence. A complex sentence consists of an independent clause (a complete sentence that can stand alone) and one or more dependent clauses (incomplete sentences that rely on the independent clause to make sense). 4. Compound-complex sentence

"He was not only a good-looking young man, but he was also intelligent and ambitious, so when he saw the opportunity to advance in his career by taking on more responsibilities at work, he eagerly accepted the challenge, even though it meant sacrificing some of his free time" [4].

In this sentence, there are multiple independent clauses ("He was not only a good-looking young man", but "he was also intelligent and ambitious", "he eagerly accepted the



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challenge") connected by coordinating conjunctions ("but", "and"), making it a compound sentence. Additionally, there is a dependent clause ("when he saw the opportunity to advance in his career by taking on more responsibilities at work") that adds further information and complexity to the sentence, making it compound-complex.
